SheCan is a financial inclusion initiative utilizing a blended finance model and the global reach of WFP to create a sustainable path toward equal economic participation for women.














Because of the SheCan loan I was able to obtain agricultural inputs on time, and I expect at least 800 kg harvest of maize, as opposed to the 300kg that I used to harvest before.

- WFP provides vouchers to Home Grown School 1 Feeding Schools
- Schools order ingredients for nutritious school 2 meals with Farmer Cooperatives

Coops have received technical assistance in financial literacy, entrepreneurship and agricultural practices


Farmers Cooperatives access tailored working 3 capital credit from affiliated Financial Service Providers to plant nutritious foods as per school order


Modality to be piloted:

Invoice financing via mobile payment providers

Farmers Cooperatives plant, grow, harvest and deliver nutritious foods to schools, get paid and repay the working capital loan







SheCan Cameroon project outcome objectives

PROJECT OUTCOME 1:

Smallholder farmers, especially women, have increased their income, boosted agricultural production, and enhanced their capacity to supply nutritious food to WFP-supported schools and the local market.

PROJECT OUTPUT 1.1:


Increased access to affordable and adequate loans from formal financial institutions for at least 750 smallholder farmers from 30 cooperatives , with a primary focus on empowering women, enables them to purchase the required farm inputs to increase agricultural production of nutritious food, which results in an increase in income


PROJECT OUTPUT 1.2:

Enhanced financial capabilities and financial management skills of at least 750 smallholder farmers (50% women) across 30 cooperatives through comprehensive, gender-transformative financial literacy programmes support the target populations in feeling empowered to take a loan and in repaying their financial obligations.
